The Consortium on Development Studies (CODS), which was founded by Dr. Gill-Chin Lim in 1982, organized the Dr. Gill-Chin Lim Global Award Committee. The Award is given out in memory of Dr. Gill-Chin Lim and in honor of his work on the study of humanistic globalization.

Early this year, the Dr. Gill-Chin Lim Global Award Committee selected Dr. Kenneth E. Corey, Professor of Geography and Professor of Urban and Regional Planning, Michigan State University as the first recipient of the Award. The Committee recognized Dr. Kenneth E. Corey's global commitment and leadership as a scholar and an educator in the field of humanistic globalization.

On June 26, 2009, the Award ceremony was held at Hanyang University in Korea. The Award carries a cash grant of \$10,000, supported by Dr. Gill-Chin Lim's family.

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Dr. Kenneth E. Corey

For over a generation, Dr. Kenneth E. Corey, AICP has been working on the role of, and planning for technology-facilitated advanced services and knowledge-economy factors at the regional and local scale of development. His focus has been on planning. This has included explicit and continuous concern for planned change, policies and program planning, planning organization and methods of planning that are based on behavioral and social science and spatial-organizational theory and concepts. His approach to these topics and methods is comparative, international and global. This includes the incorporation of networking, linkages and connectivities among the economic factors of production, consumption and quality of life amenities. The venues for Corey's planning and policy work and observations have included Southeast Asia, Korea, Sri Lanka, Western Europe and North America. Corey's research and writing have been characterized by continuing interest for enhancing the reinforcing relationships and interdependencies between planning practice and planning scholarship.

He has held academic leadership and research positions as follows. He has been Senior Research Advisor to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, Michigan State University. He was Dean of the College of Social Science at Michigan State University. At the University of Maryland, College Park, he served as Professor and Chairperson of the Department of Geography, and Director of the Institute for Urban Studies. He was Head of the Graduate Department of Community Planning and Professor at the University of Cincinnati. At the University of Rhode Island, he was Associate Professor of Community Planning and Geography in The Graduate School.

Corey has been Fulbright Research Scholar at the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies, Singapore. He has held Visiting Professor appointments at Peking University, People's Republic of China and at the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, United Kingdom.

His current research interests focus on several major projects including E-Space (Electronic Space), *K-Economy* (Knowledge Economy), and *Technology-Based Models in Southeast Asia*.

His representative publications cover *Urban and Regional Technology Planning: Planning Practice in the Global Knowledge Economy*. London and New York: Routledge, 2006 (with Mark I. Wilson); *Information Tectonics: Space, Place and Technology in an Information Age*. Chichester, UK: John Wiley & Sons, Ltd., 2000; (Co-editor and Co-author with Mark I. Wilson), and *The Planning of Change*. Third Edition, New York: Holt, Rinehart and Winston Inc., 1976 (Co-editor and co-author with Warren G. Bennis, Kenneth D. Benne and Robert Chin).

Scholar. Planner. Mentor. Leader. Poet. Gentleman. Friend. Dr. Lim was characterized as being generous, loyal, having charm and soul, and being an outstanding host and organizer. Dr. Lim has been described as influential to the best of planning and a role model. From his professional jobs, we observed a man who went beyond 'international' to function globally. He gained expertise

and perfected both his content knowledge and his process knowledge. Over the span of his highly productive career, he maintained his focus on life, and the improvement of the environment in which life must be lived. Another form of Dr. Lim's intellectual leadership was his frequent initiatives in designing and organizing conferences and brokering interaction among diverse experts and students. In short, Dr. Lim's life was invested in developing and evolving 'humanistic globalization.' Dr. Lim believed that values are the key to guiding human beings to a brighter future.

He graduated from Seoul National University, Harvard University, and Princeton University. He served on the faculties of Northwestern University, Princeton University, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Michigan State University (MSU) Korea Development Institute (KDI). Dr. Lim was MSU endowed Professor of Asian Studies in a Global Context and Dean of International Studies and Programs. He was also Distinguished Institute Professor and Dean of KDI School of Public Policy and Management.

His publications cover more than 80 refereed and invited articles, 32 books and monographs, and about 200 books chapters, papers in proceedings and reports.
